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

In the second year of our three-year strategic plan, we saw our annual budget expand to \$1.6 million, a testament to the trust and commitment of our donors, members, supporters, and stakeholders. Additionally, the introduction of our Sulcata Tortoise exhibit and designation as part of the New York State Birding Trail have enriched our offerings for nature enthusiasts of all ages.

While celebrating our triumphs, we also acknowledge the challenges we've faced, particularly the loss of our beloved staff member and Volunteer Coordinator, Jim Dauterman. SULCATA EXHIBIT

Thanks to the generous support of a donor, the Greenburgh Nature Center constructed a new enclosure for our two Sulcata tortoises. Ayo and Colonel Mustard, who are approximately twenty years old and have a potential lifespan of up to 150 years, received their forever home. Our dedicated staff members Andrew and Travis began work on the project in January, and together, they built a barn where the tortoises could safely sleep and a fenced grass area for them to roam freely.

By May, Ayo and Colonel Mustard were settling comfortably into their new habitat, enjoying the freedom to roam on the grass and bask in the warm sun. Sulcata tortoises, native to the African savanna, require warmth and are unaccustomed to the cold climate of New York. In November, the Town of Greenburgh assisted in the digging of a trench to run electrical from the greenhouse to the tortoise barn allowing for the installation of warming pads and heat lamps.

With the addition of heating, the tortoises were able to stay cozy and insulated inside their barn throughout the cold winter months. Now, Ayo and Colonel Mustard have the comfort of warmth and dryness inside the barn during winter, and they can enjoy the outdoors in their fenced area during spring and summer. Visitors have the opportunity to view this new exhibit whenever they come to the grounds of the Nature Center.





SCHOOL PROGRAMS

The Greenburgh Nature Center inspires passion, curiosity, and action for our natural world through interactive exhibits and a focus on environmental education programs. Thanks to the support of over 100,000 yearly visitors, we are able to offer a diverse array of programs for people of all ages, schools, businesses, and more. Our team of naturalists are dedicated to teaching environmental stewardship and introducing students from over 200 schools to the wonders of the natural world. We will continue to encourage people to explore, discover, and connect with nature through our programs.

Environmental Education

Our environmental programs offer year-round educational opportunities to students, that enrich and support the New York State curriculum. In an experimental learning environment, students are encouraged to engage with their critical thinking skills, while having fun and creating lasting adventures.



S.T.E.A.M.

The Nature Center prioritizes implementing Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, & Mathematics into our programming. Our S.T.E.A.M programs encourage students to be creative, use their critical thinking, and create problem-solving skills. Our educators promote the importance of teamwork and collaboration.



Sustainability

Our sustainability programs encourage students to see how they can make an environmental impact every day. This educational opportunity plays a vital role in shaping the next generation of land stewards. Our programs encourage schools to incorporate sustainability into their curriculum by establishing a schoolyard habitat, planting an edible garden, or striving to become a zero-waste school.



Discovering Ecosystems

Students learn about the interrelationships and lifecycles of plants and animals that exist within our diverse landscapes and ecosystems. With a holistic perspective, students will learn how to properly identify and care for them.



SCHOOL PROGRAMS

Climate Change & Carbon Footprint

Students learn how greenhouse gases negatively affect our climate. Naturalists teach students how to calculate their own carbon footprint. They learn strategies on how to reduce their carbon footprint and create a plan to be more eco-friendly and rely less on fossil fuels in the near future.



Garden Scholars

This highly enriching program is a great way for schools and community groups to learn how to garden and maintain it. Our Garden specialists design, implement, and educate the local school community on a variety of environmental education topics, such as vermicomposting, seed starting and dispersal, importance of bees, and pollinating insects.



Water Conservation

Our naturalists educate students on the significance of protecting our waterways and drinking water. Students learn where the water they use everyday to drink and shower comes from. This program focuses on providing strategies on how to reduce your water consumption and alternatives to water use.



Composting

This is a multi-program series where students learn how to properly sort their waste into four categories (landfill, commingled recycling, paper recycling, and compostable). Students get to see the process of composting first hand and how to convert organic waste into healthy soil. Students gain insight into the importance of sorting their waste and how it can affect the environment.



OUTDOOR SITES AND EXPERIENCES



Birds of Prey

Several birds of prey that are no longer able to live in the wild have found a forever home at the Nature Center. Our outdoor exhibit features two bald eagles and a great horned owl. Additionally, located behind the Manor House, is a bird exhibit that houses a white-necked raven named Zhou Zhou. All our bird exhibits are free to the public for visitors to say hello to our feathered friends.

Native American Village

Our replicas of Native American structures demonstrate the designs and techniques used 6,000 years ago by Eastern Woodland Indians. The replicas include a life-sized Wigwam, Longhouse, dugout canoe and hide drying rack. Naturalists teach students at these replicas how Native Americans used to live their daily lives.






Organic Garden

Our demonstration gardens show sustainable gardening techniques and inspire ideas for your garden. Our gardens display the best organic approaches to designing and planting the perfect garden bed. Our naturalists showcase how to properly harvest vegetables and herbs while tending to the garden to ensure the soil has sufficient nutrients.

Native Plant Meadow & Butterfly Arbor

Our tranquil native plant meadow, which comprises of a diverse range of native plants and supports our local wildlife. In the summer, our meadow transforms into a butterfly exhibit, that over 100 native free-flying butterflies call home, including Monarchs, Painted Ladies, and Eastern Black Swallowtails. The interactive butterfly exhibit offers an educational experience on the significance of these magnificent, colorful insects.





Beehives

Honeybees play a key role in our ecosystem, as they are vital in the pollination of food crops and native plants. At the Nature Center, we have four honeybee colonies that are expertly maintained by our resident apiarist. Through demonstrations, we showcase the importance of these pollinators. Our honeybees provide a valuable service by pollinating the plants and flowers on the Nature Center grounds.

Natural Connections

Our Natural Connections Program invites children to unleash their creativity while experimenting throughout our 33-acres. This program offers children a blend of creativity, experimentation, and education. Students explore crafting with natural materials, as well as science experiments. The Manor House turns into a part science lab, part art studio.



PROGRAMMING AND EVENTS

Plan and Plant Your Home Garden

Throughout the different seasons, our naturalists showcase ways on how we prepare and plant an organic garden at the Nature Center. They inform visitors of ways to increase chances of attracting native pollinators. Our naturalists also teach topics relating to gardening such as crop succession, companion planting, square-foot gardening, and composting.







Run Wild

Run Wild is 1.25-mile forest run and obstacle course, where an entire family can enjoy some friendly competition while staying active in the outdoors. Runners can jump, crawl, and climb through our beautiful 33-acre preserve while creating long-lasting memories. Companies can also use our Run Wild event for employees to spend time on our grounds and participate in team-building exercises.

Movie Nights

In the summer, we host outdoor family movie nights right on our great lawn. Children may even get the chance to meet one of our animals up close.





Spring Migration

Our naturalists take visitors on a walk around our grounds and identify the many species that visit the grounds during the warmer months. Participants learn how to listen for calls of native or migrating birds.

Family Programs and Community Events

Our Back to Nature program series celebrates the changing of seasons with educational, interactive, and family fun activities. The Nature Center also hosts many entertaining events, nature-based games, crafts, and activities to keep all ages in the community involved throughout the year.






Archery

The Nature Center offers private individualized or group archery instruction. Archery increases hand-eye coordination and strength. It's a great exercise to learn and experience out in nature. We also host archery tournaments for visitors to engage in some friendly competition with fun games and contests.

Volunteer Programs

We provide opportunities for individuals to volunteer at the Nature Center and gain experience as environmental educators. Our dedicated volunteer staff assists us with a variety of different tasks such as animal care, helping out during events, greeting visitors, maintaining our grounds, and participating in ecological restoration efforts. Last summer, we found a population of an incredibly rare plant known as American Featherfoil. Seeing it thrive on the grounds throughout the season made me feel so wonderful every day!


